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For research involving human participants, staff and students will be required to complete an Application for Ethical Approval form (Appendix 1), the purpose of which is to review whether there are any potentially significant ethical risks.

The form must initially be sent to the relevant supervisor and may be signed off at level 1. If a student application is signed off at level 1, the Faculty ethics representative must be notified. Student applications which cannot be approved at level 1 must be sent to the Faculty ethics representative to decide whether they can be signed off at level 2, or should be considered by the Ethics Sub-Committee at level 3.

Level 1 – Consideration

A low risk is defined as one where potential harm to participants is no greater than that encountered in everyday life. It also includes research where the researcher(s) are working with participants from vulnerable groups (in line with the Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006) but will not be alone with them at any time i.e. they will be overseen at all times by an experienced individual who holds an AccessNI check undertaken within the last 3 years, and will not be storing images, videos or personal details of children under 18 years of age.

Level 2 - Consideration

A medium risk is defined as one where potential harm to participants is greater than that encountered in everyday life. It also includes research where the researcher(s) are working with participants from vulnerable groups and/or they will be storing images, videos or personal details of children under 18 years of age, but they have produced satisfactory AccessNI check(s) on themselves undertaken within the last 3 years.

Level 3 – Detailed Consideration

This applies to activities that require careful scrutiny due to their potential for physical or psychological harm. A high risk is defined as one where there is a possibility that significant harm will be caused to participants (e.g. an adverse reaction to a drug or supplement, physical damage/injury, psychological or emotional harm). It also includes research where the researcher(s) will be alone with participants from vulnerable groups and/or will be storing images, videos or personal details of children under 18 years of age. It is most unlikely that such an activity would be permitted for an undergraduate extended essay.

The College is committed to ensuring that all research undertaken by its staff and students is conducted to the highest standards of integrity. Central to this is the consideration of ethical issues arising from research involving human participants and data. The College's policy is that all such research should undergo appropriate ethical scrutiny, to ensure that the rights, dignity, safety and well-being of all those involved are protected.

This research ethics approval form and checklist should be completed for every research project that involves human participants. It is used to determine the amount of risk of harm entailed in a proposed study and to identify whether an application for ethical approval needs to be submitted.

Ethical approval, where required, must be obtained before potential participants are approached to take part in any research.

1	Does the study involve human participants or data?

10	Will the study involve patients who are cared for in private and voluntary sector nursing homes and/or residents of residential care homes (Northern Ireland only)?
